Horn of Africa...Eritrea, Somaliland, Djibouti & Eastern Ethiopia

Eritrea is a state on the southern shores of the Red Sea whose history dates back to the Stone Age. Following a succession of wars with Ethiopia that spanned a thirty-year period, Eritreans under a United Nations' supervised referendum voted for independence in 1991 and gained international recognition in 1993. Asmara, the capital, proudly displays a shining collection of Art Deco and other architectural wonders. Massawa, a port city on the Red Sea, was heavily influenced by the Turks and the Europeans. This coastal city is the starting point for visits to the Dahlak Islands, one of the most unspoiled and least known reefs in the Red Sea. Eritrea's nine colorful ethnic groups are diverse and individual and are a major highlight. The latest peace agreement with Ethiopia has finally put an end to the utter isolation that Eritrea suffered for the last decades and carries a great future for development.

Somaliland should not be confused with Somalia. Westerners are welcome there... Somaliland is home to what is often considered one of the most interesting attractions in the Horn of Africa, the Laas Geel cave paintings. Untouched for nearly 10,000 years until discovered by a French archaeological team in November 2002, Laas Geel cave paintings have become a major tourist

attraction and a national treasure. Somaliland boasts many natural attractions including mountains, mangrove marshes and pristine beaches as well as opportunities for cultural interaction in its colorful markets.

Djibouti draws few tourists thanks to its reputation for being the hottest place in Africa (probably true) and being ridiculously overpriced (also probably true). However, with vistas that will take your breath away, and a culture caught halfway between 20th century France and modern Africa, the smallest country in the region is most definitely worth a visit. Despite the tensions that at least two of these neighbors often display, it remains somewhat removed from the hostility. Thanks largely to it being located at the entrance of the Red Sea. Djibouti has found itself in the enviable position of being a strategically important point with both global industry and the military. The country itself, outside of Djibouti City the capital of the Republic of Djibouti is largely composed of volcanic wasteland an apocalyptic looking terrain of naturally formed chimneys and beautiful lakes.

Eastern Ethiopia many of you may have joined us on the Ethiopia tours in the past years, but most likely, you have not visited this gem of a city. Harar, a well-preserved walled city that stands to the east of the Great Rift Valley and was founded between the 7th and the 11th centuries and emerged as the center of Islamic culture and religion in the Horn of Africa; it also served for a long time as an important trading center. Harar was a fiercely religious city

and was closed to visitors until 1887 when King Menelik restored central rule. With its 99 mosques, including the 16th century Grand Mosque with is beautiful twin towers and slender minaret, it is considered to be the fourth most holy city in Islam after Mecca, Medina, and the Dome of the Rock in Jerusalem. Besides its many mosques, Harar is also home to 102 shrines and a very vibrant marketplace, regarded as one of the most colorful in all of Ethiopia. The surrounding Ahmar Mountains are where Ethiopia's best coffee grows. One of the most unique experiences in Harar is feeding at night the "friendly" Hyenas that come and congregate around the city at dark (III - */***)

No doubt, that South Sudan is one of the most challenging destinations for the intrepid traveler like you but this country, which gained its independence in 2011 earning the title of the world newest country has apprehended the attention from all travelers around the world with their prehistoric cultural rituals, a countless colorful local tribes and untouched natural beauty.

Your expedition starts and ends in Juba, the capital of the young nation, where you will wander around the city and overnight to experience what the nightlife has to offer. Our extensive tour allows you to experience the genuine South Sudan by heading out of the very strictly controlled capital and visiting not one but four ethnic communities with the freedom to interact, photograph and learn directly from the locals. This is something that only a very few visitors experience. You will journey with us to the incredible Lotuko people, the main ethnic group living around Torit Town in villages nestled in the hills and hidden among the rocks. In addition, the Boya people, called "Larim people", who are centered on a small and rather ramshackle settlement in the shadow of the mountains and gigantic boulders and the Toposa people, known as fierce warriors and cattle stealers. They live in villages made of mud and sticks with thatched roofs often adorned with the skulls of cattle. You will end the tour with a visit to the Mundari tribes - herders who live in the wild in symbiosis with their cattle. They are unmistakable as they cover their whole body in chalk-like makeup, making them appear as ghosts. (III-*-***)

Niger

A landlocked country named after the Niger River, is home to a wide variety of ethnic groups. The largest of these groups are the Hausa, followed by the Zarma. There are many other nomadic tribes throughout Niger including the Taureg and Fulani. Niger has stunning natural beauty, especially in the Mountain ranges in the north, but also houses a few old trading centers in the Sahara such as Agadez and Zinder that have a distinct mixture of Arab, Tuareg, and black African culture. The locals are also very friendly - do not be surprised if you are invited into someone's home! A wild giraffe herd lives near Koure, which is only around 37 miles from Niamey on a paved road. However, you will need a 4x4 vehicle and a guide to get you there. The giraffes live near many people and are rather curious and friendly. You can approach within 30 feet or so before they become more cautious. You'll also see other mammals such as elephants, lions, and hippos at the W Wildlife Reserve. (II- **)

Burundi

Travel to some of the least explored parts of East Africa on this two-week journey visiting three beautiful countries: Uganda, Rwanda, and Burundi. Starting with **Uganda**, a country located on the East African Plateau, you will experience beautiful waterfalls, Lake Victoria, the world's largest lake, and the world's longest river, the Nile. You will also have the chance to see all kinds of wildlife, including the majestic and endangered mountain gorilla. Then cross into Rwanda to discover the beautiful Lake Kivu, one of the African Great Lakes. One of the highlights of your visit will be the chance to see the splendid Golden Monkey, one of the rarest primates in the world. Also, experience the Rwandan culture at a traditional village. Continue your journey to Burundi, which has two national parks - Kibira to the northwest, and Ruvubu to the northeast. Both were established in 1982 to conserve wildlife populations. Burundi's culture is based on local tradition and the influence of neighboring countries. (III - ***)

Nigeria

Discover one of Africa's most vibrant ancient kingdoms on a trip that will challenge any preconceived ideas about Nigeria. The nation has a recent reputation that discourages many travelers, but this tour shows the historic and appealing cultural legacy of the Oduduwa Kingdom that dates to the 1200s and encircles the globe. We begin from Lagos, one of the liveliest cities on Earth, to the central town of Ilorin, and then on to the coastal town of Badagry, which has secrets to uncover connected to the 17th century slave trade. See how Yoruba culture traveled worldwide from the old city of Abeokuta, with its grand Afro-Brazilian buildings, and climb the sacred Olumo Rock, a local holy site. From there, we head to the virtually unknown Idanre Hills, to discover a hidden civilization and, in Osogbo, we learn the intricacies of Yoruba religion from revered priestesses. Our last stop is Ilorin, the last site of the Oduduwa dynasty, conquered by Fulani Jihadists in the early 18th century, where Islamic life fused with Yoruba culture. (II - **/***)

Ivory Coast

As one of Africa's most recent additions to tourism, the **Ivory Coast** was out of bounds for years due to political conflict. Situated on the Atlantic coast of West Africa, Côte d'Ivoire - or Ivory Coast as some may call it, provides a range of landscapes that are sure to please - from the beaches and inland lagoons in the south and dense tropical forests in the southwest, along savannas and grassy plains in the interior, to impressive montane forested mountains in the north. The country also has a fascinating cultural heritage. Spend time with different ethnic groups such as the Baulé, who are known for their fine craftsmanship, the Dan, Lobi, and Fulani, as well as the Senoufo, who are known for their handicrafts that feature their own cultural themes and religious beliefs. During village visits, you will witness colorful tribal festivals, rituals, initiations, and amazing mask dances. Each ethnic group has its own style of music, most showing a strong vocal polyphony. The Arabian Gulf... Kuwait, Bahrain, UAE & Oman

Known for their wealth and abundance of oil, the Gulf States also house some remarkable museums that display magnificent ancient Islamic art, calligraphy, pottery, embroideries, and jewelry. This unique tour will visit Bahrain, an archipelago located in the heart of the Gulf that boasts a unique blend of ancient and modern; a destination where glistening skyscrapers share the skyline with majestic, centuries-old mosques. In Qatar, you will saunter around the Old Soug (market) and down to the nearby Dhow Harbor to see some of the Gulf's traditional and distinctive trading vessels and the world-class Islamic Arts Museum. Kuwait, home to the oldest modern art movement in the Arabian Peninsula, contains an impressive number of art galleries. A quick stop in Kuwait City is just enough time to experience its diverse and liberal culture. In the UAE, you will marvel at Abu Dhabi's unique architecture as one of the most futuristic cities in the world. When in Dubai, an emirate that has transformed itself in the last few decades from an obscure pearl-fishing village into one of the world's most important trading hubs and a land of luxuries, you will visit its Old town. Oman is one of Arabia's true gems - a land of rugged coastlines and vast deserts where tradition and progress go hand in hand. This wonderful adventure takes us from the heart of its picturesque capital, deep into its desert. (II - ***)

Gabon, CAR, Congo & DRC

Travel to some of the least explored parts of Africa on this journey visiting these beautiful countries: Gabon, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo & Congo. Gabon features internationally celebrated masks, such as the n'goltang (Fang) and the reliquary figures of the Kota. Small populations, as well as oil and mineral reserves have helped Gabon become one of Africa's wealthier countries. The country has generally been able to maintain and conserve its pristine rain forest and rich biodiversity. The CAR consists of Sudano-Guinean savannas, but the country also includes a Sahelo-Sudanian zone in the north and an equatorial forest zone in the south. What is the Central African Republic today has been inhabited for millennia. However, the country's current borders were established by France, which ruled the country as a colony starting in the late 19th century. The DRC has a wonderful and vibrant city called Kinshasa, which you will get to experience. Once was a site of fishing and trading villages; Kinshasa is now a mega-city with an estimated population of more than 11 million. Kinshasa has a flourishing music scene which, since the 1960's, has operated under the patronage of the city's elite. The Congolese culture has been influenced by a wide variety of natural landscapes, stretching from the savannah plains in the North Niari flooded forests, to the great Congo River, to rugged mountains and forest of Mayombe, and including 106 miles of beaches along the Atlantic coast. The presence of numerous ethnic groups and various political

structures (the Kongo Empire, the Kingdom of Loango, the Kingdom Teke, and the Northern chiefdoms) once provided an enormous amount of diversity in the traditional cultures as well as in many ancient artistic expressions. Join us in discovering the magic of Central Africa. (III-**-***)

Chad and Cameroon

Thriving traditional cultures, renowned art forms, flamboyantly colorful festivals, and a dazzling ethnic mosaic are the golden gems of tribal Africa. This fantastic cultural odyssey takes you to the remote and seldom visited countries of Chad and Cameroon.

Chad is one of the least visited of all the African countries by western tourists and therein lies its appeal. We are proud to offer a trip to this most pioneering of destinations - a land that is as wild as it is beautiful, as untamed as it is graceful. It is a land of rock arches, camel caravans traversing the sands, and where genuine encounters with local people are guaranteed. Each year, the semi-nomadic Wodaabe people gather for a week of incredible celebrations known as the Gerewol, a colorful ceremony that is one of Africa's most spectacular. Few westerners are privileged to see this fascinating event, but over the years, we have built up excellent local contacts, allowing you to travel to a remote part of Chad and stay with these intensely traditional people to join them in celebration. Camping in the Sahel, you will stay with the Wodaabe for several days, gaining more than just a fleeting glimpse into their lives and immerse vourself in a culture that lives very much outside of mainstream society. Few tourists venture this far into Chad, so you can expect to have a very intimate experience.

Cameroon, sometimes described as "Africa in one country" in reference to its variety of habitats and people, is a land that will steal your heart away. This virtually unexplored country is home to an astonishing 250 ethnic groups and a matching diversity of landscape - from the jungles of the south to the Sahel of the north. The southern

rainforest is home to communities of Ba'aka and Badgeli pygmies, existing in harmony with their environment. In-between lie ancient kingdoms, cattle herding nomads, stunning golden, palmfringed beaches, glassy rivers, and volcanic mountain ridges. Forest canopies throb with the call of the rarest of species and colorful tiny markets and streets bustle with excitement. Photogenic waterfalls thunder down in a "white smoke" of spray to pristine rivers and lakes. A trip to Cameroon will allow you to see nature at its wildest and rarest to places where few outsiders have been fortunate to explore. (III - **-***)

Sultanate of Oman

Oman is one of Arabia's true gems - a land of rugged coastlines and vast deserts where tradition and progress go hand in hand. We will take in the breathless landscapes of the Hajar Mountains, the shifting sands of Wahiba, and explore the old forts of Nizwa. It is a journey of incredible contrasts, following in the footsteps of the pioneering explorers of old and discovering some of the richest natural and cultural highlights that Arabia has to offer. Shopping for native crafts in vibrant markets provides the opportunity to interact with the locals. Oman is also steeped in myths and legends as it is believed to be the home of Sinbad the Sailor and the site of the ruins of the palace are reputed to be that of the Queen of Sheba. (II - ****)

Atlantic Coast... Guinea, Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Guinea Bissau

This once-in-a-lifetime overland journey travels to some of the best cultural, natural, and religious environments of West Africa's Atlantic Coast. Traverse across an incredible variety of landscapes – from beaches and inland lagoons and along savannas and grassy plains to dense tropical forests and lush green mountains. During this multifaceted

expedition, meet and interact with various ethnic groups, including the Dan, Fula, and Guéré, a tribe well known for their masks that are considered a masterpiece of African art by many.

Begin in Monrovia, **Liberia**, founded in 1822 when it was settled by emancipated slaves from America and learn about the history of the slave trade. Drive west along Liberia's southern coast to the quiet fishing village of Robert sport, a small town situated on the Cape Mount Peninsula.

Cross the border into Sierra Leone and travel through stunning scenery to Bo, one of the most ethnically and religiously diverse cities in the country. The route continues back towards the coast for an exciting wooden boat ride to the Banana Islands. The inhabitants of today are descendants of freed slaves from the Americas that settled here in the 18th and 19th centuries. In Freetown, another settlement of freed slaves, acquire a deep understanding of the Trans-Atlantic slave trade.

Traveling along the coast and along river deltas, cross into Guinea to the major port capital city of Conakry. From here, venture off the tourist path and travel along rolling grasslands and through the jungle, stopping to visit spectacular waterfalls to the Fouta Djallon region, home of the Fulani ethnic group. This is an excellent place to indulge in West African culture.

The journey continues across the Guinea border into Guinea Bissau, West Africa's only Portuguesespeaking country. Travel through tropical savannahs and pass interesting villages on the way to the Gabu region, home to a Fulani Muslim community. Navigate the Bijagos Archipelago, a stunning treasure comprising of 88 islands and inlets, and explore its lush tropical forests, coastal savannahs, pristine beaches, and turquoise waters. The ethnic groups that inhabit these islands have been shielded from outside influences and have managed to maintain their unique traditions. They are known for their fascinating Bijago tribal art used in ritual practices. End in bustling Bissau, the main port city for fishing in the country. See the strong Portuguese influence in the architecture and come together with the locals at the city's main market.

For those who would like to experience more Atlantic Coast culture, consider adding on the extension that continues overland into **Senegal** and The **Gambia**, ending in Dakar. (III - */***)

Socotra

Arab governments are in conflict over an island paradise in the Indian Ocean that few people have ever seen. Socotra, the largest island in the Middle East, is one of the most isolated places on Earth, home to an ancient culture and some of the world's strangest-looking plants. The island is part of Yemen, but the United Arab Emirates has been investing there, building infrastructure.

UNESCO has designated Socotra as World Heritage site in 2008 in recognition of its biodiversity. Hundreds of Socotra's species of plants, reptiles and land snails exist nowhere else on earth. Notable are the dragon's blood trees that look like flying saucers perched on trunks. Adenium socotranum are trees that look like elephants' legs with pink flowers on top. Birds such as the Socotra Starling, Socotra Sunbird, and Socotra Grosbeak are found nowhere else on the planet. Bats are the island's only native mammal. In 2010, a Russian archaeological team discovered the ruins of a city on Socotra dating to the second century AD. The island is also held by some to be the location of the original Garden of Eden, due to its isolation, biological diversity, and the fact that it is located on the edge of Yemen's Gulf of Aden, which many connect with the ancient Sumerian tales of a paradise called Dilmun. Arabia Felix was the name bestowed on the region by the Romans. It merited its name due to its fertile lands, distinguishing from the barren north, the so-called Arabia Deserta. This enabled the people to prosper and grow into a dominant force that controlled trade between the east and west. Yemen has been at the crossroads of the Middle East, Asia and Africa for thousands of years thanks to its position on the spice routes. Living at the height of the area's dominance were the Sabaeans, subjects

of the Kingdom of Sheba. Little remains of this ancient civilization, but traces of this enterprising people and their culture can be seen in the descendants who populate this rich historical land. We cannot visit everything in Yemen those days due to unrest in many parts, but we are lucky to be able to explore the 2 safest parts: in/around Sana'a and the island of Socotra, a UNESCO World Heritage Natural site. Untouched and unique in its beauty, it is also home to an ancient culture of intact and very hospitable people. (II - **)

The high mountain valley of Hunza is located in the extreme north of Pakistan, fortified by the giant mountain ranges of Karakorum, the Himalayas, the Hindu-Kush, and Pamir through the Wakhan Corridor. The Indus Valley of south Pakistan is a repository of some of the most ancient sites of civilization and human history. From the Moghul city of Lahore to the cacophony of Karachi's markets on the Arabian Sea, you will pass through so many ruins and sites filled with Sufi shrines, mausoleums, mosques, palaces, and ruins of fabled ancient cities. Later Ceuta and Melilla became the site of a Carthaginian settlement, which was taken over eventually by the Romans. In the 5th century the cities were captured by the Vandals, who in time lost it to Byzantium. After that the Visigoths, Arabs, Portuguese, and finally the Spanish in 1580 seized control. Since that time, except for a period from 1694 to 1720 when the Moors gained control, the enclaves have remained under the jurisdiction of Spain. Separated from Spain by the Straits of Gibraltar and sandwiched between Mediterranean Sea and the Atlantic Ocean lies Morocco on the northern shores of Africa. Discover the rich history and culture of the Imperial Cities and the north. This tour will capture the dramatic contrasts of the kingdom. Against a backdrop of breathtaking scenery, the footprints of history wind from antiquity through the pinnacle of Islamic achievement in a country determined to modernize on its own terms. From the middle of the 1st millennium BC until the 10th century AD the territories of modern Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, and Tajikistan were part of the Persian Empire. You will explore shimmering desert towns, UNESCOlisted palaces, stark soviet towers, bizarre oil-boom buildings, and the history of the ancient trading routes between east and west. Stretching all the way from China to the Mediterranean, the Silk Road is a historic and cultural marvel. Caravans laden

with, amongst many other things, gold, ivory, spices, furs, jade, exotic animals and of course, silk, trundled along the vast network of trade routes that made up the road for nearly two millennia. Not only were goods transported on the route, but it also acted as a bridge that brought cultures and ideas together; Islam and Buddhism reached China thanks to the Silk Road while it facilitated the spread of Persian, Greek, Roman, Indian, Arabian, and Chinese influences around the world. Central Asia was a major center for three great religions: Zoroastrianism, Buddhism, and Islam. Mosques, mausoleums, madrasas, and traditional souks offer a glimpse of times past.

Jordan

Evening meals in Amman will be at ACOR where the program of the day can be discussed and plans for the next day reviewed.

The local guide will accompany us on all excursions and provide many insights into the country and its

The birth date of Pamir Highway can be considered March 14, 1981 when lieutenant colonel Bronislay

Grombchevskiy read a lecture on "Our interests in Pamir. Military-political outline" at the secret meeting of the General headquarter of the Russian army in Saint Petersburg. The aim of this secret bridgehead was to prepare for any possible invasion of the British Empire to Central Asia. (II/III-***/****)

Angola

In the cities, where slightly more than half of the population now lives, you will find a mixed culture that has been emerging since colonial times. In this urban society, since its foundation in the 16th century, the Portuguese heritage has become more and more dominant. However, African roots are evident in music and dance, and are molding the way in which Portuguese is spoken. This process is well reflected in contemporary Angolan literature. Turkmenistan

Turkmenistan is an independent and neutral state located in Central Asia. The geographical position is more advantageous than its neighbors due to the outlet to the Caspian Sea. When traveling far inland, you can see sandy deserts with barchans, as it is a country of deserts, oases, and unique historical and cultural traditions.

The most ancient civilizations of the world prospered on its territory. Turkmenistan is a country of contrasts, especially today, as the cities have entirely changed and become more similar to European megacities. But despite all the changes, their Oriental character has been preserved in unique architecture, decoration of buildings, numerous mosques, and ancient monuments. It is the least explored country on the Silk Road, with a rich ethnic tradition, world-famous carpets, moonlike landscapes, newly discovered ancient civilizations, spectacular Islamic monuments, and deserted caravan cities - a lost world of Central Asia.

Four-fifths of the country is covered by the large and spectacular Kara Kum or Black Sands desert, where we will observe an industrial phenomenon known as "Fire Crater or Gate to Hell." The country is home to Turkmen, who trace their descent from nomadic tribes living in the Altai Mountains above Mongolia in the 5th century AD. The warm and friendly Turkmen people are some of the most appealing in Central Asia. The Turkmen's traditional clothes, with huge sheepskin hats, long coats, and boots, are true to their nomadic traditions. From the middle of the 1st millennium BCE until the 10th century CE the territories of modern Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, and Tajikistan were part of the Persian Empire. Later the Silk Road connecting China with Europe ran through the region. (II - ****)

Cyprus and the Greek Islands...Crete, Santorini & Rhodes

Cyprus is an island with a unique archaeological legacy - from its beautiful sanctuaries and monuments to the architectural marvels scattered along its craggy mountains, verdant plains, sweeping beaches, rolling hills and abundant vineyards. This Mediterranean island lies at the crossroads of three continents - where East meets West, and a new experience awaits you under the sun of Cyprus.

Crete is an island with an exquisite 700-mile-long coastline dotted with numerous coves, bays, and peninsulas, and a multitude of soft, sandy beaches that line the dazzling blue Mediterranean Sea. As the home of the Minoan civilization, the island is of historic importance in today's world with important archeological finds at Knossos, Phaistos, and Gortys. There are many jewels just waiting to be discovered by the more adventurous explorers. If you have not visited Crete yet, maybe now is the time to come and explore this fascinating Greek island.

Santorini is one of the Cyclades islands in the Aegean Sea. It was devastated by a volcanic eruption in the 16th century BC, forever shaping its rugged landscape. The whitewashed, cubiform houses of its two principal towns, Fira and Oia, cling to cliffs above an underwater caldera (crater). They overlook the sea, small islands to the west, and beaches made up of black, red, and white lava pebbles. Santorini boasts that it is one of the most romantic spots in the world.

Rhodes, the largest of Greece's Dodecanese islands, is known for its beach resorts, ancient ruins, and remnants of its occupation by the Knights of St. John during the Crusades. The city of Rhodes has an Old Town featuring the medieval Street of the Knights and the castle like Palace of the Grand Masters. Captured by the Ottomans and then held by the Italians, the palace is now a history museum. Displaying one of the most extensive collection of relics and treasures. (I - ****)

Uzbekistan

The mountainous grasslands of Mulanje, Nyika, and Zomba plateaus afford spectacular photo options, and game-rich national parks and wildlife reserves provide exceptional wildlife viewing equal to those in East Africa. Malawi's greatest asset is her people - always ready for a laugh, a little chat, and an impromptu song and dance. Malawians' easy-going and warm nature makes this country one of the safest and most enjoyable places to travel in Africa.

Zimbabwe is well known for its amazing wildlife, but few know about its impressive ancient ruins or well-preserved cave art. This tour focuses on the historical and cultural side of Zimbabwe. Explore the Great Zimbabwe ruins, the largest and most significant stone archaeological complex in sub-Sahara Africa, thought to date back to the 11th century. It was built by the Karanga, ancestors of the Shona tribes, and for unknown reasons, the city

was abandoned when the Portuguese arrived in 1552. Another fascinating highlight is the ancient cave paintings at Matobo Hills, home to some of the world's most extraordinary prehistoric bushman artwork. The paintings, now a UNESCO World Heritage Site, feature wildlife such as giraffes, lions, and rhinos as well as humans that date back to 13,000 years.

South Caucasus...Azerbaijan, Georgia & Armenia

Traverse part of the ancient Silk Road and see the only surviving intact caravansary in Armenia. Explore archaeological excavation sites and watch as the past, undisturbed for thousands of years, emerges before your eyes.

Uganda, Rwanda & Burundi

Indian Ocean Islands... Maldives, Seychelles, Mauritius, Réunion and Comoros

The Indian Ocean covers about one-fifth of the world's total ocean area, spanning from the Eastern shores of Africa to the western shores of Asia and Australia. It is the youngest of the three major oceans, with fewer islands when compared to the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. Many have explored it, from the Egyptians around the 18th century BC to the Arabs between the 9th and 15th centuries. European navigators began their explorations of the Ocean in the early 16th century, including the famous British navigator James Cook in 1772. This journey voyages to some of the Indian Ocean's most including stunning islands, the Maldives. Seychelles, Mauritius, Réunion, and Comoros.

The **Maldives**, an archipelagic state in South Asia of the South Inia shores, comprises 1,192 coral islands grouped in a double chain of 26 atolls. The islands

are known for their attractive white sandy beaches, striking emerald waters, and beautiful over-thewater bungalows. Its people are master boatbuilders and skillful artisans. The Maldives is home to around 5% of the world's reefs that attract thousands of fish, making it an excellent destination for snorkeling.

The journey continues west towards the African coast to **Seychelles**, an island republic consisting of 115 islands, mostly uninhabited. It is a paradise for nature lovers who will find its lush, tropical vegetation, rocky mountains, and pristine sandy beaches worth exploring. Seychelles is among the world's leading countries that protect its threatened species, such as the Seychelles black parrot and the Aldabra giant tortoise.

Mauritius lies off the eastern coast of Madagascar and is known for its stunning beaches, lush national parks, towering mountains, and iridescent lagoons. Although settled by Portuguese sailors in the early 16th century, it was dominated by the French in the early 18th century contributing to its profound French presence.

Another French-influenced destination not far from Mauritius is **Réunion**, a volcanic island with substantial ethnic diversity. The country has a high rate of endemic species of plants and is home to many native bird species. Its waters teem with sea life, including eels, angelfish, sea urchins, sea turtles, and dolphins. Humpback whales migrate annually between June and September to breed.

Comoros is a group of islands on the northern end of the Mozambique Channel off the east coast of Africa that receives very few visitors. This tropical island paradise is a unique destination where one can escape the crowds and familiarity of the well-known tourist paths offering an exotic blend of rich history, strong culture, and magnificent landscapes. **(II -****)**

Balkans...Albania, Macedonia, Kosovo, Montenegro, Croatia & Slovenia

The Balkans' region is an amazing cultural mosaic of diverse ethnic fabric combined with historical

importance and natural beauty. Journey through the former Yugoslavia that is home to a very eclectic mix of people, ethnically, geographically, and religiously. This strikingly beautiful region is famous for its turquoise-colored coastline dotted with gorgeous villages. Its rugged interior mountains are home to a gamut of high perching monasteries and churches, spectacular lakes, and waterfalls. Albania is a former enclave of the Ottoman Empire, and today this nation is emerging from its medieval existence under a strict Communist regime. It offers the visitor a glimpse into a unique cultural heritage. Visit exotic bazaars, Ottoman citadels, mosques and towns, medieval churches, fortresses, and monasteries as well as ancient Roman ruins and many UNESCO World Heritage sites. (II - ***)

Northern Greece, Macedonia, Bulgaria and Romania

The focus of this tour will be the dramatic mountain scenery and exquisite jewel-like villages, farms, churches, and monasteries of the four countries visited. This simple, agrarian way of life is a vestige of the culture that once dominated the continent but has virtually disappeared in Western Europe. Expect to be entertained by craft traditions, folk music, and dance. The towns are equally impressive; most of the overnight stops are in medieval walled burgs built by Saxon settlers. Romania is noted for its vineyards and interesting heavily influenced by Hungarian cuisine, specialties. Continue on to Bulgaria, one of the smallest countries of the Old Continent but with a wealthy history in the Balkan region. From settlement on top of settlement Bulgaria is a repository of ancient sites from many civilizations that inhabited the region through millennia. Buffeted by Roman, Byzantine and Ottoman influences and dotted with beautiful lakes, threaded together by a network of rivers, Macedonia is a repository of history surrounded by beautiful scenery. In Northern Greece, you will discover grandiose archaeological sites. picturesquely labyrinthine villages, and the great city of Thessaloniki, famous for its dazzling Byzantine heritage, outshone only by that of Constantinople (Istanbul) itself. The Croatian coastline is one of the most beautiful in the world. Chad & Camroon...Gerowol Festival

Chad is one of the least visited of all the African countries by western tourists and therein lies its appeal. It is a land of rock arches, surprising wildlife, camel caravans traversing the sands, where genuine encounters with local people are guaranteed

The particular Chad tour will take you to the spectacular Ennedi Massif; a remote, breath-taking, and otherworldly landscape. The Ennedi is a vast collection of Sandstone Mountains and rock formations sculpted by the wind and sand over millennia. Here we enter the land of the Tubu, one of Africa's most traditional and least known people, and our excellent local connections ensure rare opportunities to meet these shy and secretive people. We will see rock art dating back thousands of years and walk into the Guelta d'Archei where the Tubu bring huge herds of camels to drink at the only waterhole for miles around, in the company of one of the last populations of Saharan crocodiles, which we hope to see. Kurdistan...Yazidi Festival

Kurdistan, the autonomous northern region of Iraq predominantly inhabited by the Kurds, is amazingly different from the areas populated by the Arabs. The terrain is in stark contrast to the desert that characterizes middle and southern Iraq. It is an eclectic region that offers a multitude of experiences and chance encounters. Tour the

world's oldest inhabited city with its famous museum of antiquities. Visit monasteries and churches dating from the 2nd to 4th century and the holiest sites of the Yezidis including the cave of the fire worshippers. Drive through breathtaking views of Kurdistan's mountains, rivers, and waterfalls. Explore former Jewish cities and other ancient locations such as Amadiya. Shop in the local bazaars for gold, silver, carpets, spices – you name it. From the great walled city of Erbil to nearly deserted but still-functioning monasteries to gushing rivers like the Greater Zab and Lesser Zab feeding into the Tigris, the region has much to offer the seasoned traveler. OUR TRIP GRADING CHART

We have been using the following system to help you identify the tour that best matches your travel interests and your physical abilities by ranking activity grade levels and lodging standards. Not every trip fits the needs and the expectations of travelers or their tolerance levels. We hope that this new system will make it easier to find the program that is right for you.

Trip Grade:

I Easy - Reasonably paced sightseeing, easy walking, and leisurely days. There are no particular physical challenges.

II Active - Some hikes, slightly more demanding walks at or to sites, few elevations, comfortable but busy schedule, and some long rides.

III Challenging - Parts of the trip are physically challenging and involve hiking on rough terrain in sand or at high altitudes. There may be very long drives on rough roads, weather conditions with high heat or humidity, and the presence of insects. You may have simple picnic lunches, primitive bathroom facilities along the road, and remoteness from modern towns or cities.

Lodging Level:

- *** Simple**: One or more properties on the trip are very basic, rustic, and primitive, with shared bathroom facilities (1 or 2 stars).
- ** Basic: Comfortable yet on the Spartan side, usually small but generally with private facilities. Some such lodges and motel-style need repairs, added cleaning, and improvements, but they are suitable for one-night stays even if they lack western-style amenities (2 or 3 stars).
- ******* Superior: Lodges and hotels with additional amenities, refined service, and comfort level acceptable to the Western standards. (3 or 4 stars).
- *** Luxury: Regular-style hotels are usually large and of typical Western standards, with ample venues and full amenities (4 or 5 stars).
